Dear Faithful & Friends of Ypapanti Parish,

The Orthodox services and hymns for the Nativity of our Lord are incomparable, deeply mystical, gems of liturgical worship and theological reflection. It is only right that we commemorate the birth of the Son of God with special reverence and solemnity. What kind of parish would we be if we ignored the majesty of Christmas?

Our tradition calls for a full complement of liturgical services on Christmas Eve and Christmas morning. The day beginning in the morning of Christmas Eve (the paramon of the Feast) and extending into the evening, with Great Vespers and Artoklasia, into the morning hours of Christmas Day. There is a definite parallel between the Feasts of the Nativity and Holy Pascha. The only variation is that for the Nativity, we move Orthros and the Divine Liturgy from midnight hours, to morning daylight hours. As directed by our Metroplitan Savas, we will celebrate the services accordingly.

As an older priest, with many experiences, I feel compelled to remind you, with love and concern, that if we neglect the services of Christmas, we dishonor our Lord and minimize our faith, crippling our witness to the world and robbing our souls of the Word of Life. It is an extremely sad sight to see the church sparsely occupied on Christmas Eve and Christmas morning, when the nave should be full and the air resplendent with the sounds of joyous hymns as we welcome the Birth of God's Only-Begotten Son. "This is the reason why the Word of God was made flesh, and the Son of God became Son of Man: so that we might enter into Communion with the Word of God, and by receiving adoption might become Sons (and daughters) of God." (St. Irenaeus of Lyons).

We compromise our faith with regard to Christmas, if we ignore the beautiful services of the Church. It is tragic that so many have relegated Christ to a minor role in this Holy Season. When family holiday traditions once centered around Church services, now for many they do not include them at all! Under the circumstances the remedy is to work to conform our holiday observances to the Church, not to ask the Church to conform to our own.

Remember: "He that loves father and mother more than Me, is not worthy of Me: and he that loves son or daughter more than Me, is not worthy of Me" (Matthew 10:37).

With heartfelt love I greet you all, as we approach the Great Feast of our Lord's Birth. May the Lord bless us, our families and our troubled world.

It's nice to take a step back to remember that this is a season for giving and making others happy, which is such an amazing feeling. Second, as someone who loves working

with young children, and I believe every child should get to experience the excitement of opening a present on Christmas morning. Jesus loves children, and with the Angel Tree, we get to exemplify that love to our sweet young neighbors.

I love to imagine the surprise they must feel when they get presents from our parish that they were not expecting to get due to financial hardships at home. So, I encourage you, if you're able, to spread joy with me this year by taking a name off of our Angel Tree. ITS NOT SUPPOSED TO HURT THERE

When you go to a doctor for your annual check-up, he or she will often begin to poke, prod, and press various places, all the while asking, "Does this hurt? If you cry out in pain, one of two things has happened. Either the doctor has pushed too hard, without the right sensitivity. Or, more likely, there's something wrong, and the doctor will say, "We'd better do some more tests. It's not supposed to hurt there!"

I feel this way when I speak to my congregation about stewardship. If they cry out in "pain" after hearing my sermons on giving, I wonder if I've pushed too hard, or if there is need in their lives for the Great Physician because a Christian isn't supposed to "hurt there." Giving should be second-nature to Christians.

St. Paul tells the Corinthians that God loves a "cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:7). He even teaches them "He who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and he who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity..."(2 Corinthians 9:6,7). This Christian mindset toward sharing our "wealth" is just the outward "symptom" of a deeper healing of our souls.

How can one become a "cheerful giver?" How can we learn how to avoid giving "grudgingly or of necessity?" What kind of transformation of a man's soul makes this kind of attitude possible?

The simple (not easy) answer is love.

Wait; don't get too far ahead of me. I'm not talking about the syrupy sentimentality that all too often passes for love nowadays. And I am certainly not talking about a guilt-ridden emotional manipulation that seems to shame us into giving. No, I am talking about the "agape" first shown to us by God that, when received, actually "changes" us. It is this sharing of love between Man and God that can liberate each of us from a soul destroying selfishness that makes true spiritual freedom an elusive dream.

Take a moment to consider these three invitations to love that will, by God's grace, transform you into a "cheerful giver."

First, The Invitation to Receive. The amazing truth is that until you and I can receive God's love, our souls are far too small to truly consider giving or sharing our lives as a joyful act. You must first open your heart to receive what St. Paul called God's "indescribable gift" (2 Corinthians 9:15). It is in daring to believe that God truly loves me unconditionally and has already shared ALL He has with me in the gift of eternal life in His Son, Jesus. God has given completely and freely with no guarantee of any return on His eternal gifts. He knows He never will diminish Himself by sharing all He has with us, so He invites us to receive His gift of love. If you have the courage to accept this invitation, His selfless love will enlarge your soul and make you a cheerful giver.

Second, The Invitation to Respond. The wisdom of the Church in calling me to do the hard work of Christian prayer and worship is precisely to constantly encourage me to stay open to the love of God. This is an everyday battle because we live in a world consumed with self-interests and fear. But God's love invites me to respond to Him and His willingness to cheerfully give. And the only proper response to such a loving Gift is gratitude. It is exactly this heart of gratitude that is at the center of the Church's emphasis on prayer and worship. At the heart of Orthodoxy is the Eucharist, which is humanity's act of gratitude in return for the loving gift of life from our Creator.

Finally, The Invitation to Reveal. After having Received God's Love and Responded to God's love, we are now invited to Reveal God's love. When I stay awake to God's gracious and cheerful Gift of eternal life through applying the wisdom of the Orthodox faith to my everyday living through daily prayers, fasting, feasting, and alms giving, I make visible in my everyday choices and actions that God's love isn't just the empty rhetoric of a half-hearted religion, but a true and authentic relationship with God. I reveal my true faith; I reveal my true motives, my true attitudes, when I choose to cheerful share of what I have in direct response to all God has given me.

Becoming a cheerful giver is actually about becoming an authentic Christian. At the heart of the Christian message is giving as God gives us His Son so that we could live forever. How you give of your time, talents, and treasures makes visible who you really are and what you really believe. In any event, encouraging you to become a "cheerful giver" isn't pushing too hard because, for a Christian, it isn't supposed to hurt there. If it does, then ask yourself if you have received, responded, and revealed the love of God.
